The reauthorization of the law was not achieved in 2007, but it is expected that attention will be redirected to this law immediately after the election of the new president.

All District presidents will be sharing the attached information with the District shepherdesses who in turn will be contacting you. The Education committee wants to get this material in the hands of as many UMW members as possible. Please consider carefully the attached information and become involved in making a difference in the lives of the children in our state.

A sample letter is included herein. Of course, we do not want thousands of the sample letter sent, but we do want thousands of similar letters as well as emails sent. We want to get across the point that we are a large organization (thus the membership number) and that we have put much time and money into helping the public schools across Western North Carolina (thus the dollar value of our work). It is imperative that changes be made in the No Child Left Behind law, and we have recommended in the sample letter the changes that are advocated by Women's Division.

No Child Left Behind (NCLB)

Information contained herein was obtained from a variety of websites including the US Department of Education, United Methodist Women's Division, and the National Council of Churches (NCC) Committee on Public Education and Literacy.

The **No Child Left Behind Act of 2001** is a controversial US federal law that reauthorized a number of federal programs that were intended to improve the performance of US primary and secondary schools. The law includes four principles of educational reform: stronger accountability for results, expanded flexibility and local control, expanded options for parents, and emphasis on teaching methods that have been proven to work. The legislation is based on the belief that high expectations and setting of goals will result in success for all students. States are required to develop assessments in basic skills that will be given to all students in certain grades if those states are to receive federal funding for schools.

Student progress and achievement is measured according to a test that is given to every child every year. The results are available in annual report cards on school performance and on statewide progress. By relying on a single test score, the law fails to honor children's growth and accomplishments, increases pressure on schools to push out low-scoring adolescents into GED programs or focus only on children whose scores are close to the passing rates, narrows the curriculum to focus primarily on the areas tested and reduces time for the arts and social studies, and overly punishes special needs children and English language learners. The resulting labeling of schools and districts as "low performing" is driving racial segregation in particularly metropolitan areas where the press identifies affluent, white suburban districts according to standardized test scores, as the only good place to raise a family

Teachers feel trapped by demands they cannot meet even while doing the best they can. United Methodist Women strongly support improving public schools, but we fear that the production target of "all children proficient by 2014" is unrealistic. We fear that the law has undermined education for our most vulnerable children in big city districts. It has penalized their schools and school districts with sanctions that have redirected Title I funding away from educational programming to pay for transportation and privatized, supplementary tutoring services for which there is no quality control. Parents with children in failing schools can be allowed to transfer their child to a better-performing public or charter school immediately after the school is identified as failing. While the law sets reconstitution of staff, charterization, and state takeover as the final sanctions in the fifth year, there is no evidence that the disruption caused by staff reconstitution improves school in the short run.

NCLB causes schools to be ranked according to test score thresholds of children in every demographic subgroup, a “failing group of children” will know when they are the ones who made their school a “failing” school. They risk being shamed among their peers, by their teachers, and by their community. The **No Child Left Behind Act** is an unprecedented effort to expand the role of the federal government in education. The Constitution contains no provisions for influence in education. However, if states wish to benefit from the federal education funding, they must comply with whatever regulations Washington imposes.

Another component of **NCLB** is that it authorizes an increase in federal funding for reading and links that funding to scientifically proven methods of reading instruction through the Reading First plan.

The **No Child Left Behind Act** is up for reauthorization. We are urging the United Methodist Women of the Western North Carolina Conference to become knowledgeable about the legislation and to get involved in public education advocacy.

The United Methodist Women’s Division is advocating significant changes to **NCLB** in coalition with ecumenical partners and an alliance of 140 national organizations that have signed a Joint Organizational Statement on **NCLB**. We are called upon as women of faith to share our concerns and expectations with members of Congress that they address the law’s injustices.

Specific recommendations from Women’s Division are below:

- Fully fund **NCLB** and fully authorize Title I. The federal government must substantially underwrite the costs, especially in districts with diminishing tax bases and exploding needs that serve populations segregated by race and extreme poverty.
- Reduce reliance on one annual standardized test by incorporating multiple measures of achievement including portfolios, teacher made tests, and other indicators such as grade promotion and graduation rates.
- Replace the current system that credits learning only when average group scores reach benchmark targets with a growth model that tracks each student’s learning over time.
- Require all schools to match the rate of progress shown by research to be actually achievable, and scrap the unrealistic “all children proficient by 2014” deadline.
- Replace sanctions (that too frequently redirect funds into unregulated, privatized tutoring service with professional development driven by the needs teachers identify. Build public school capacity by reducing class size, and improving school climate in our poorest schools.

Contact your representatives and let them know that you want to make a difference in the lives of the children of our state and nation.

As members of the Western North Carolina Conference UMW, we are called into action through this special initiative. Update and Action on No Child Left Behind Act Reauthorization

Jan. 21, 2008 – Reauthorization of No Child Left Behind (NCLB), the federal law that governs the operation of our public school system, was not achieved in 2007. However, that does not diminish the importance of this vital piece of legislation. United Methodist Women encourages members to continue to be advocates for fully-funded public education in their local communities and across the country.

Contact your Congressional representatives about this important law.

Ask Congress to:

- Fully fund the law;
- Set ambitious, yet reachable, goals;
- Reduce reliance on standardized testing;
- End labeling children, blaming teachers and bringing stigmas to schools; and
- Take steps to develop programs that will improve the capacity of every school to serve children.

United Methodist Women advocates significant changes to NCLB in coalition with ecumenical partners and an alliance of 140 national organizations that have signed a Joint Organizational Statement on NCLB.

Use resources from the National Council of Churches of Christ Public Education and Literacy Committee in discussing NCLB. These resources include: Ten Moral Concerns about NCLB, Talking Points and a bulletin insert for Fixing NCLB, and Questions to Ask Congresspersons.

Changes now being discussed by Congress contain some good suggestions, but do not go far enough. NCLB would remain too much a test and punish law, and would remain vastly under funded. As people of faith we are called to share our expectation that Congress address the law's injustices:

- Fully fund NCLB and fully authorize Title I. The federal government must substantially underwrite the costs, especially in districts with diminishing tax bases and exploding needs that serve populations segregated by race and extreme poverty.
- Reduce reliance on one annual standardized test by incorporating multiple measures of achievement including portfolios, teacher made tests, and other indicators such as grade promotion and graduation rates.
- Replace the current system that credits learning only when average group scores reach benchmark targets with a growth model that tracks each student's learning over time.
- Require all schools to match the rate of progress shown by research to be actually achievable, and scrap the unrealistic "all children proficient by 2014" deadline.
- Replace sanctions (that too frequently redirect funds into unregulated, privatized tutoring services) with professional development driven by the needs teachers identify. Build public school capacity by reducing class size, and improving school climate in our poorest schools.

Call the U.S. Congress switchboard, 202-224-3121, or write a letter to your representative at their district or state office. Check the government section of your local telephone book to find out their local contact information. Often a letter to their district office is received quickly. You could also send an e-mail. If you write a letter to their office in Washington, D.C., use the following:

Begin the letters: "Dear Senator (last name) or Dear Representative (last name)." A list of senators can be found at <http://www.senate.gov/>. A list of representatives can be found at <http://www.house.gov/>.

State your purpose for making this contact immediately then utilize information pertinent to your position. Use personal examples to make your point. Always be courteous. Try to keep your contact clear and short. Be sure to conclude any contact with: your name, address, city, state and zip code.

35. Volunteer in school - tutor, reading, health fair, lunch buddy, field trips
36. Educate units about Guardian Ad-Litem; promote participation to reach out to children who have been pulled out of their homes; be a Christian influence on these small children
37. Publish names and addresses of legislative representative – promote Action Network and bring notification to local units of issues in Congress that we should react to and have sample letters for notification to legislators
38. Recognize teachers in district at any and every UMW event
39. Contact the Director of School/Community Relations person to see where the needs is. Invite this person to a meeting.

WNC – UMW Public Education Initiative Suggested Action Plan List

1. Educate Local Unit about the Public Education Initiative
2. Make appointments with principal – ask what the school’s needs are
3. Church (small) – team up with larger church in more populated area to have program
4. Prepare flyer for Prayer Breakfast to introduce public education initiative idea
5. Train District Executive Committee
6. Plan cluster meetings of local churches or take information when visiting through LUV
7. Get a list of schools with needs – Church School Connections
8. Sponsor Education Forum with School Board Candidate, County Commissioner; host Voters Registration on the same day
9. Get more mentors/volunteers from the churches and UMW
10. Individual awareness of what’s going on in school system; meetings/PTA



11. Have letter writing campaign at each district event with focus on public education; No Child Left Behind
12. Encourage every unit to have contact with a local school
13. Encourage each unit to become part of action alert
14. Keep education alive in our churches and unit (LUV visits); use youth groups and get them involved to know struggles
15. Host school clean-up (summer painting)
16. Know election issues and bonds – get out and VOTE!
17. Attend School Board meetings and County Commissioner meeting – as a listening ear!
18. Become more educated about the laws that effect children and education – invite school personnel into your church to share their knowledge, sponsored by UMW but attended by all
19. Use Shepherdess Program (visitation) to share knowledge and ideas; help everyone see how education affects everyone, even those without children
20. Support a local ministry to help children i.e. Light Share, etc
21. Have hand on project for schools
22. Encourage the Children’s Sabbath in all congregations
23. Partnership with other churches to provide community school needs
24. Encourage local units to have public education moment or bulletin board to heighten awareness in the local churches about public education
25. Find out which schools in district are not supported by Communities in Schools by a church or UMW group – encourage local units to take/adopt a school
26. At District Annual meeting have everyone bring a “designated” item for school, i.e. Kleenex, paper towels, crayons, etc – find out what is needed
27. Compile a list of way to volunteer
28. Have a plan to help local units implement public education initiative
29. Have a booth at each district event; providing information on public education
30. Develop a form to have units report back what they are doing in the areas of public education
31. Put pictures and articles in newsletter about what local units are doing in local schools

Dear

I am a member of United Methodist Women in the Western North Carolina Conference, an organization of 33,485 members. In the past year, we have contributed through monetary gifts, school supplies, and volunteer time more than \$1,071,646.38 to the public schools in North Carolina. As you can see, we are committed to helping our schools be the best they can be.

I am aware that the No Child Left Behind law is up for reauthorization. I am advocating significant changes in the law and have outlined those below:

- Reliance on one annual standardized test to determine whether children and schools are making adequate yearly progress needs to be changed to the utilization of multiple measures of achievement including teacher made tests, portfolios, and other indicators such as graduation rates and grade promotion.
- Tracking each student's learning over time with a growth model should replace the current system that recognizes progress only when average group scores reach benchmark targets. End labeling of children and bringing stigmas to schools.
- The federal government should substantially underwrite the costs of fully funding No Child Left Behind as well as fully authorizing Title I. School districts with diminishing tax bases and demands to serve populations segregated by race and extreme poverty cannot be expected to compete favorably with school districts in affluent areas.
- Utilize the research showing the rate of progress that is actually achievable for children and discard the unrealistic expectation that "all children will be proficient (meaning at grade level) by 2014." I advocate setting ambitious, yet reachable, goals.
- Take steps to develop programs that will improve the capacity of every school to serve children by reducing class size and improving school climates in our poorest schools. Sanctions that redirect funds into privatized and unregulated tutoring services should be replaced with professional development that is determined by needs the teachers themselves identify.

I ask that you give serious consideration to my proposed changes to the No Child Left Behind law and use your influence to address the law's injustices.

Another Sample Letter to Congress

For all persons of faith...not just United Methodist Women

From “Study Guide for ***Tested: One American School Struggles to Make the Grade*** for Congregational Adult Education, Justice Committees, and Reading Groups - An Exploration of Injustice in the Federal Public Education Law, the No Child Left Behind Act”, by the National Council of Churches Committee on Public Education and Literacy

Dear [Senator or Representative]

As a person of faith I want you to know that justice in public education is much on my mind during this election year.

Thank you for your attention to the needs of our children and their schools in this time as Congress has been discussing the reauthorization of the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB). because I do not support a philosophy of test-and-punish, I look for a more carefully considered role for the federal government in federal education policy.

Many of my concerns grow from the excessive use of standardized testing in NCLB. I do not view children as products to be tested and managed. I support the use of growth models and multiple forms of assessment, and I ask you, while setting high standards, to develop policy that values the accomplishments of all children and their schools. Please find a way to set high expectations for all children while at the same time eliminating the unrealistic goal of universal proficiency by 2014.

My second area of serious concern is about the pressure of raising standardized test scores in basic skills only... in reading and math. In many schools such pressure has dangerously narrowed the curriculum to the subjects being tested. As a person of faith I view each child as a unique human being, created in the image of God, to be nurtured and educated. I ask you to emphasize the formation of the whole child by fully developing each child’s gifts—intellectual, physical, civic, psychological, and ethical. Require a rich curriculum that includes reading, math, the humanities, the sciences, the social studies and the arts.

A third concern for me is the under-funding of NCLB by the federal government. Having authorized additional funding, Congress has never met its commitment to the states by appropriating what has been authorized. I ask you fully to fund the mandates of this law. I ask you also to use the leverage of federal power to expand educational opportunity by pressing states to address school funding inequity. The United States is a society with pockets of deep poverty and other pockets of astounding affluence. NCLB has been a double blow because it imposes sanctions without equalizing resources and opportunity. Please reduce sanctions that privatize services by directing public tax dollars away from the public schools.

Although NCLB culminates our society’s growing computerized capability to measure and quantify, education remains primarily qualitative—the establishment of trust between teacher and child—the development of community within and beyond the school. I ask you to change NCLB to uphold high expectations for all children but honor every child’s accomplishments; shift the focus from punishing public schools to strengthening them; reduce high stakes testing; and fully fund the law.

How to Contact Your Member of Congress

Faith and Action

United Methodist women have always believed that faith and action go hand in hand. As women in mission, we have worked against slavery, against sweat shops and child labor. We have promoted racial justice and world peace. Today we continue to contact our legislators on issues impacting women, children and their families. In so doing, we make our faith live. *And we make a difference.*

How To Write Your Members of Congress

- **Type or write neatly.** Consult a reliable list of members of Congress for correct spelling. Put your return address on your letter. Envelopes are thrown away.
- **Keep your letter brief.** Short is beautiful! Address only one issue in each letter. Begin your letter by stating what action you hope your legislator will take (e.g. "I urge you to support the Act for Better Child Care.") Note: e-mail messages are not as effective as personalized, handwritten letters.
- **Be polite.** Legislators are human. Always state your concerns courteously. If possible, thank your legislator for some action he or she has taken which you support.
- **Share your concerns as a person of faith.** Identify yourself as a member of United Methodist Women. Tell why you believe a bill should be supported or opposed. Share positions of The United Methodist Church on the issue by sending copies of General Conference resolutions with your letter.
- **Share your experiences.** If you write about the needs of the aged, share your needs or those of aged family members. If you write about children, share your concerns about the children you know.
- **Write on a timely basis.** Your letter is important anytime, but it will have the most impact if it is received when a vote is about to be taken.

How To Telephone Your Members of Congress

- **When to Telephone:** When lead time on action is limited, phone calls are an effective way to register your concern.
- **Where to Telephone:** *Washington:* The Capitol Switchboard is (202) 225-3121. Ask the operator to connect you with your legislator. *Local Office:* Every member of Congress has a local office. Your local newspaper or county courthouse will have the number.
- **What to Say:** Give your name and town. When calling Washington, ask for the legislative aide who deals with the issue of concern to you. Identify yourself as a member of the United Methodist Women and share your concerns. Be brief. Mention the bill number or title of the legislation and ask your legislator to support or oppose the bill.

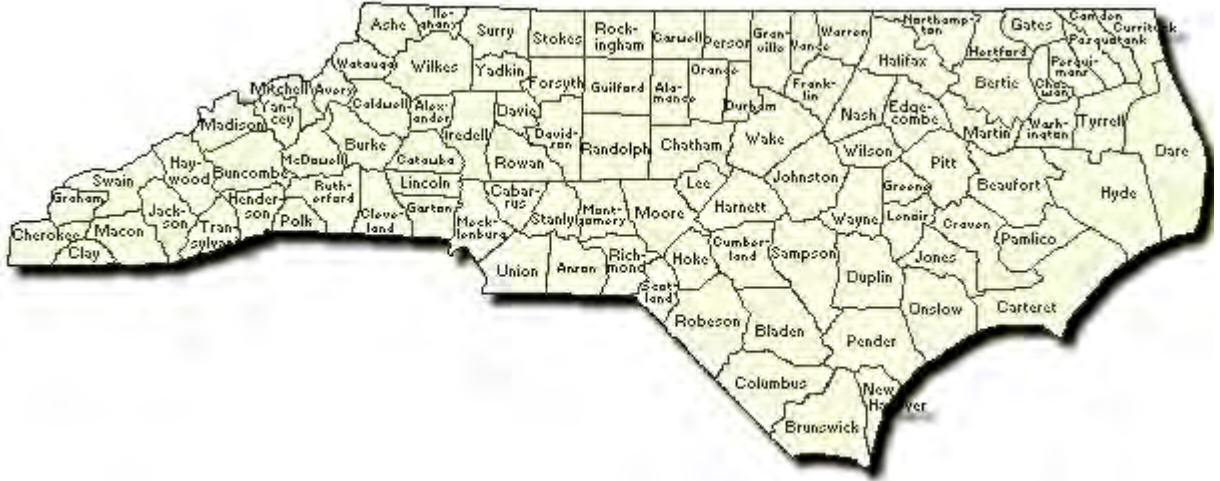
